We insist that individual papers can only be accepted after satisfactory review by two independent referees. The questions on the review forms are similar to those for *Journal of the Geological Society*. The referees' forms and comments must be available to the Society's Book Editors on request.

Although many of the books result from meetings, the editors are expected to commission papers that were not presented at the meeting to ensure that the book provides a balanced coverage of the subject. Being accepted for presentation at the meeting does not guarantee inclusion in the book.

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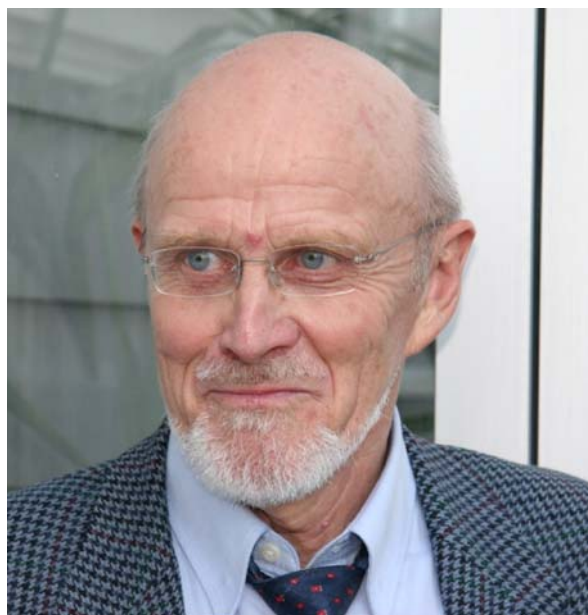

In his 73rd year, Professor Harald Svendsen sadly passed away on November 30th 2009. Harald was a pioneer in investigating the Arctic fjords of Svalbard. He used his extensive knowledge of mainland Norwegian fjords, to investigate the importance of rotational dynamics in broad fjords. He also saw very clearly the importance of multi-disciplinary research to understand the links between the geology, physics and biology of

fjords. By his attitude he gained a broad network of collaborators who will all greatly miss him, both as a scientist and as a friend.

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
